Dear Senator Darling and Representative Nygren:

In accordance with Section 51.06 (8), Wisconsin Statutes, enclosed is a copy of the report on people relocated and diverted from nursing homes, intermediate care facilities for individuals with intellectual disabilities (ICFs-IID) and State Centers for People with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities in state fiscal year (SFY) 2013. This report provides information related to four programs, the ICF-MR Restructuring Initiative, the Community Integration Program (CIP)1A, the Community Relocation Initiative and the Nursing Home Diversion Initiative.

The Department's relocation and diversion programs have been successful by assisting 558 frail elders and people with physical and developmental disabilities to move from ICFs-IID and nursing facilities to community-based settings. Since State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2006, 5,203 elders and people with physical and developmental disabilities have successfully relocated from institutional settings and an additional 1,141 people were diverted from admission to a nursing home through the Department's outreach and community planning efforts. The quality of life for these 6,344 individuals has been enhanced through the opportunity to live in the community, be near family and friends and to more fully involved in their communities.

Highlights of the relocation and diversion initiatives over the past eight years (SFY 2006-2013) include:

- 857 people with developmental disabilities, many of whom resided in institutions for decades, moved to the community and participated in community activities that were not previsously available to them.
- 2,964 frail elders who resided in nursing facilities chose to live in the community near their families and friends.
- 1,382 people with physical disabilities chose to live in the community where they were able to access community activities, rather than live in nursing facilities.

- People with intellectual or developmental disabilities have been served in the community at a cost that is within, or lower than, the anticipated institutional budget for people with complex needs.
- Frail elders and people with physical disabilities are being served in the community at a cost below that of institutional care, resulting in savings under the Medical Assistance Program of \$1.045 million in SFY 2013 for individuals relocated during the year. The savings compound over time as each person remains in the community-based setting.
- 836 elders and 305 people with physical disabilities, who were determined to be at imminent risk of having to move to a nursing facility, were able to remain in communitybased settings via the availability of diversion funding.

SFY 2013 REPORT on RELOCATIONS and DIVERSIONS from INSTITUTIONS

As required by s. 51.06 (8)

Executive Summary

Through three program initiatives, the Department has been providing elders and people with physical and developmental disabilities residing in nursing facilities and Intermediate Care Facilities for Individuals with Intellectual Disabilities (ICFs-IID) the opportunity to relocate to community-based settings. Under another program initiative, the Department provides support to a limited number of individuals who are at imminent risk of entering a nursing home to be diverted from nursing home admission and remain in community settings.

The Department's relocation and diversion programs have been highly successful over the years, providing the opportunity in State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2013 for 558 elderly individuals and people with physical and developmental disabilities to live in community settings, closer to family and friends and community activities. As shown in the summary table below, 368 or over 65%, of all relocations and diversions were frail elders; 126 or 22.58%, were persons with physical disabilities; 64 or 11.47% were individuals with developmental disabilities.

Since SFY 2006, 5,203 elders and people with physical and developmental disabilities have successfully relocated from institutional settings and an additional 1,141 individuals were diverted from admission to a nursing home through the Department's programs. The quality of life for these 6,344 individuals has been enhanced through the opportunity to live in the community and be near family and friends and more fully engaged in community activities.

^{*}DHS does not operate a specific diversion initiative for people with developmental disabilities, but new placements into institutions are limited and new people are enrolled in home and community based programs each year on a regular basis, essentially diverting them from institutional care.

During the early years of these initiatives, a pent up demand for relocation resources and significant outreach and effort on the part of DHS and local long-term support programs produced significant results. A number of factors over the previous few years resulted in a reduction in the number of moves in SFY 2011 and 2012. These factors include: a leveling of the demand for relocation resources as a result of the entitlement to community based long-term care in most counties that have transitioned to Family Care; a slowing of the pace of closures and down-sizing efforts by ICFs-IID and nursing homes; and the overall reduction in the number of Medicaid members in nursing facilities. Numbers of relocations are up in SFY 2013 as DHS continues to focus on efforts to increase outreach to people in nursing homes. The experience of the past eight years is summarized in the table above.

Highlights of the relocation and diversions initiatives over the past eight years (SFY 2006-2013) include:

- 857 people with developmental disabilities, many of whom resided in institutions for decades, moved to the community and participated in community activities that were not available to them when they resided in institutions.
- 2,964 frail elders who resided in nursing facilities chose to live in the community near their families and friends.
- 1,382 people with physical disabilities chose to live in the community where they were able to access community activities, rather than live in nursing facilities.
- People with intellectual or developmental disabilities have been served in the community at a cost that is within, or lower than, the anticipated institutional budget for this population.
- Frail elders and people with physical disabilities are being served in the community at a cost below that of institutional care, resulting in a level of savings under the Medical Assistance Program in SFY 2013 of \$1.045 million for the people relocated during the year.
- 836 elders and 305 people with physical disabilities, who were determined to be at imminent risk of having to move to a nursing facility, were able to remain in community-based settings because diversion funding was made available.

In 2007 the Department was awarded a federal "Money Follows the Person" (MFP) grant to support rebalancing of the long-term care system through further relocations from institutions to the community. Starting October 2007 and continuing to October 2016, the federal government pays a match rate that is higher than the standard Medicaid matching rate for the costs of certain relocated individuals during their first year in the community. A total of 217, or 47% of the 459 of the individuals relocated during SFY 2013, also participated in Money Follows the Person.

Background

Relocation Initiatives

The Department provides elders and people with physical and developmental disabilities residing in nursing facilities and ICFs-IID the opportunity to relocate to community-based living arrangements under the following three programs:

- ICF-IID Restructuring Initiative
- Community Integration Program (CIP) 1A
- Community Relocation Initiative

Although the funding mechanisms for these programs were established under the legacy Community Integration Programs and Community Options Program waivers, persons who relocated from institutions to Family Care, Family Care Partnership and PACE are included in the ICF-IDD Restructuring Initiative, CIP 1A, and Community Relocation Initiative numbers

ICF-IID Restructuring Initiative

The ICF-IID Restructuring Initiative serves persons with developmental disabilities receiving active treatment in a non-state-owned Intermediate Care Facility for Individuals with Intellectual Disabilities (ICF-IID) or a non-state-owned nursing facility. (Relocations from the three State Centers for People with Developmental Disabilities are part of the Community Integration Program 1A described below.) The initiative was authorized in the 2003-05 biennial budget bill and became effective on January 1, 2005. Under the initiative, counties are required to prepare a community plan for every person residing in an ICF-IID and for every person seeking admission to an ICF-IID. The plan must be submitted to the court and the court must consider the plan, along with other information presented to the court. If the court determines that the community is the most integrated setting appropriate to the needs of the individual, the court must order the person to be served in the community. If the person with a developmental disability was a resident of an ICF-IID or a nursing facility, the initiative allows money that was previously used to fund his/her institutional care to follow the person into the community to fund communitybased care. Funding can also be used under this initiative for community placements for people relocated from facilities that are closing or downsizing. Under this initiative, the entire cost of the person's care plan is funded by the state. Therefore, no county tax levy funding has been required to fund these relocations.

In SFY 2013, a total of 64 individuals with developmental disabilities moved into the community from non-state-owned ICFs-IID and nursing facilities. In their new community settings, these individuals had their care needs fully met and participated in community activities that were not available to them when they resided in institutions.

As a result of the ICF-IID Restructuring Initiative and other factors the long term care system for individuals with developmental disabilities has significantly rebalanced. Since the start of this initiative in January 2005 through SFY 2013, a total of 844 individuals transitioned to community settings. In June of 2013, only 212 individuals were living in the remaining nine

ICFs-IID excluding the State Centers, which is a 22% decline from the population in those facilities a year earlier. Twenty-three ICFs-IID, or more than 70% of all ICFs-IID other than the State Centers, have closed over the course of the initiative.

Community Integration Program (CIP) 1A

The Community Integration Program 1A supports relocations of individuals with developmental disabilities from the long-term care programs in the three State Centers for People with Developmental Disabilities to homes in the community. The CIP 1A program began in 1981. As established in the 09-11 biennial budget, effective SFY 2010 the Department adopted a universal budgeting methodology that eliminates an upper limit on daily costs (formerly \$325) and provides the full funding needed in the community for each relocated resident. In SFY 2013, no one relocated from a long-term care program in a State Center to the community. Historically, there have been many relocations from the State Centers, but the State Centers have not5 allowed any new long term care admissions for over twenty years. As a result, the remaining long term care residents at the State Centers are residents with guardians who have repeatly chosen to remain at the State Centers in past years.

Community Relocation Initiative

The Community Relocation initiative provides elders and persons with physical disabilities residing in nursing homes the opportunity to relocate to community settings. People being cared for in nursing homes have a choice to remain in their current setting, or move to the community, if their care needs can be met at home, in an apartment or in an assisted living setting. The funding being used for an individual's institutional care "follows" the person into the community to be used in the home and community-based waiver. The Community Relocation Initiative was authorized in the 05-07 biennial budget bill and began in August 2006. In SFY 2013, a total of 395 people relocated from nursing homes under the Community Relocation Initiative. Of the 395 total, 284 were elders and 111 were people with physical disabilities. These individuals chose to live in the community where they could be closer to family and friends and more fully access community activities.

Individuals of all ages chose to relocate to community settings under the Community Relocation Initiative, as shown in the chart below. It is particularly striking that 208, or 53%, of the individuals who chose to relocate were age 75 or older and 4 people were age 100 or older.

Individuals with both relatively short-term and long-term stays chose to relocate, as shown in the chart below. There was a noticeable difference in relocations under the 100 day mark as compared to SFY 2012. In SFY 2012, 57 or 16% of individuals relocated had nursing home stays of 100 days or less, while 302 or approximately 84 % had been in the nursing home more than 100 days. Of the individuals relocated in SFY 2013, 123 or 31% had been in the nursing home for 100 days or less, while 272 or approximately 69% had been in the nursing home more than 100 days.

Diversions

Nursing Home Diversion Program

The Nursing Home Diversion Program provides support to individuals who are at imminent risk of entering a nursing home to be diverted from nursing home admission and remain in community settings. The program was authorized in 2005 Wisconsin Act 355 and began in April 2006. Participants in this program are served under the Community Integration Program II (CIP II) Medicaid home and community-based waiver. To be eligible for these diversion funds, a person is required to meet certain risk criteria as defined by the Department in addition to meeting the functional and financial eligibility criteria for CIP II. The statute originally authorized the Department to provide an enhanced CIP II rate for up to 150 individuals who are diverted from imminent entry into a nursing home and to provide diversion opportunities for additional individuals, subject to the concurrence of the legislature. Subsequent to the original legislation, the Legislature passed and the Governor approved 2009 Wisconsin Act 277. This Act, which became effective in May 2011, removed the limitation on the number of CIP II nursing home diversion slots available to be used by counties to divert high risk elders and persons with physical disabilities from entering nursing homes.

To be eligible for diversion funding, an individual must meet all of the following criteria:

- Belong to a target group served by CIP II (elderly age 65 or older and/or have a physical disability);
- Be functionally and financially eligible for the CIP II program;
- Reside or intend to reside in a community setting that is eligible for CIP II;
- Meet high risk criteria for imminent entry into a nursing home;

• The costs of the person's Medicaid funded community care plan must be no greater than the Medicaid costs the person would have incurred in the nursing home.

As a part of the diversion initiative, the Department was required to develop and utilize criteria to determine who is at imminent risk of entry into a nursing home. In developing the criteria, the Department reviewed national studies, analyzed Wisconsin data and consulted with county long-term support coordinators and staff. Factors that are considered in the criteria include:

- Meeting an intensive skilled nursing (ISN) level of care;
- Facing an imminent loss of current living arrangement;
- Having a fragile or insufficient informal caregiver arrangement;
- Having a terminal illness;
- Having multiple other factors that are associated with nursing home entry.

Under the Nursing Home Diversion program in SFY 2013, a total of 99 individuals were diverted from nursing home admission and remained in community-based settings, staying close to family and friends and involved in the community. Of the total, 84 were elders and 15 were individuals with physical disabilities. The diversion program is only available in the 15 counties that are still operating the CIP II waiver. (The number of counties operating CIP II, and therefore eligible for diversion slots, has decreased over time due to the expansion of Family Care.)

Individuals of all ages benefited from the Nursing Home Diversion program, as shown in the chart below. Significantly, two-thirds of the individuals diverted from nursing homes were age 75 or older. The youngest person diverted was age 22.

Nature of Living Arrangement

The following table shows the living arrangement for individuals relocated in SFY 2013. Most notable is that elderly individuals, individuals with physical disabilities and individuals with developmental disabilities all indicated a preference to relocate to a home or apartment setting rather than a regulated residential setting (Community Based Residential Facility, Residential Care Apartment Complex, or Adult Family Home); 317 or 69% moved to a home or apartment. The next most frequestly chosen setting was a Community-Based Residential Facility (CBRF), with 25% of individuals choosing that setting.

Duration of Relocations

Of the 395 elders and people with physical disabilities who relocated from nursing homes in SFY 2013, 55 died and 13 returned to a nursing home during the fiscal year. The remaining individuals continue to live in the community and virtually all continue to receive services through Family Care, Family Care Partnership, PACE or the CIP II home and community-based waiver program.

Of the 64 people who relocated from an ICF-IDD, two of the individuals who relocated SFY 2013 died during the year. No one was relocated from a long-term program at a State Center during the state fiscal year. Appendix B provides information on deaths and returns to institutions among people who have moved from ICFs-IID and State Centers since SFY 2006.

Costs Under the Medicaid Program

To determine the net Medicaid cost of the relocation programs, Medicaid costs were calculated for both the period when the person was in an institution and the period when the person was living in the community. The analysis examined the following two components: (a) the

institutional or home and community-based waiver costs; and (b) other Medicaid costs, termed MA Card Costs, which include the Medicaid costs for personal care services, therapeutic services, and all other MA services. This provides a comprehensive presentation of the person's Medicaid costs in each setting.

Community Relocation Initiative

As summarized in the table below, in SFY 2013 the average daily cost in the nursing facility for individuals before they relocated under the Community Relocation Initiative was \$145.21. In contrast, the average daily cost in the community after relocation for these same individuals was \$107.65. Community relocations under the CRI were cost effective, producing an average daily savings of \$37.56, representing a 26% cost reduction.

As shown in the table below, the total MA cost in SFY 2013 of serving the 395 individuals who relocated to the community under the Community Relocation Initiative during the period they lived in their new community settings was almost \$3 million. If instead these individuals had remained in their institutional settings during this time period, their MA cost of services would have been almost \$4.04 million. Due to the difference between institutional and community costs, the Community Relocation Initiative produced total savings of more than \$1.045 million in SFY 2013.

ICF-IID Restructuring

When implemented in 2005, the ICF-IID Restructuring Initiative established an amount of funding to be used for the costs of all individuals eligible for the initiative either in institutional or community settings. The Department was expected to manage the costs of serving those individuals remaining in institutions and the costs of new community relocations within the global ICF-IID Restructuring budget. As managed long-term care and IRIS have expanded to a large portion of the state, the Department has moved away from this budgeting mechanism for the ICF-IID Restructuring Initiative. The most recent year for which we have an estimate of this budget was \$65.5 million All Funds (AF). The SFY 2012, cost of serving the ICF-IID Restructuring population in both institutions and community settings is estimated at roughly \$41 million AF.

CIP 1A Program

As noted above, individuals with developmental disabilities relocated under the CIP 1A program are funded by the state MA program for their actual community costs. The institutional cost at the State Center where they resided will be decreased by the amount of the individual care plan, making the program cost-neutral.

Nursing Home Diversion Program

The average daily community cost of individuals served under the nursing home diversion program in SFY 2013 was \$60.71, of which \$53.05 was waiver costs and \$7.66 was card costs. The projected daily MA cost of serving these individuals if they had entered a nursing home is \$129.06 based on the projected average facility cost for non-developmentally disabled nursing home residents in SFY 2013 and estimated card services for the Community Relocation Initiative prior to relocation.

The estimated cost of the individuals served under the nursing home diversion program in SFY 2013 is \$960,000 AF. The projected cost of serving these individuals in nursing homes, if they had needed to enter a nursing home, during the same time period was \$2.04 million AF.

Impact on Health and Safety

Home and Community-based Waiver Quality Assurance

Assuring the health and safety of frail elders and individuals with developmental and physical disabilities is a paramount goal of the Department whether these individuals live in an institution or community settings. All of the individuals relocated under the programs described in this report are participants in one of the Department's Medicaid Home and Community Based Waivers, which include Family Care, the self-directed IRIS waiver, and the traditional waivers (Community Integration Program and Community Options Program). All of these waivers operate under federally approved plans that include extensive risk assessment and mitigation and quality assurance and improvement protocols intended to ensure health and safety for participants.

All participants have highly individualized support and service plans that promote individual outcomes, informed choice and community participation, in addition to addressing health and safety needs. Care management staff are required to have contact with participants at regular

intervals, including face to face visits, to ensure that services and supports are being delivered as required and to address new needs that might arise. For persons relocating from institutions, a visit will occur shortly after the move to the community to assess the adequacy of the support and service plan and identify any issues that occurred after the move.

For all participants, on-going assessments are methodically completed and updated. In Family Care, care planning is carried out by an interdisciplinary team, which includes a nurse. Many counties also employ nursing personnel as part of their care management teams under the traditional waivers. When unmet needs are identified, the care plan is modified to address those needs. In addition to waiver services and supports, individuals also receive community health services such as physician and dental visits, hospital care, personal care in their home, and pharmacy.

The Department requires Family Care Managed Care Organizations (MCOs), the IRIS Consultant Agency and counties that administer the traditional waivers to have a system to ensure waiver participants are adequately protected from physical, verbal, and sexual abuse as well as maltreatment, neglect and financial exploitation and violation of their rights under law. The Department also requires these entities to have an effective response system when incidents of this kind arise and mechanisms for reporting incidents to the Department.

The Department uses state staff or contractors to monitor the extent to which waiver agencies comply with waiver requirements. This oversight also includes paper reviews and on-site visits using a variety of sources such as case records, satisfaction surveys, and visits with program participants.

Regulatory Oversight

The Division of Quality Assurance conducts regular on-site surveys of licensed community residential facilities (3-4 bed Adult Family Homes and Community-Based Residential Facilities) much like it does for ICFs-IID, using state guidelines and standards. Counties and Managed Care Organizations are responsible for assuring high quality services and environments for individuals living in smaller settings. Residential and day-service providers also have procedures and practices that maintain each person's safety and health. Because they interact with each person on a constant basis, medical conditions are monitored, social and environmental situations are structured, and individuals with special needs are given sufficient supports.

The Department oversees these programs and service delivery systems by having staff disbursed throughout the state to facilitate and monitor these efforts through several types of activities, including: random unannounced visits, in-depth annual plan review, as well as on-going dialogue with all stakeholders (including consumers and their families/guardians). The Department issues guidelines, and establishes policies and procedures whenever necessary, when gaps are identified or suspected.

Actual or suspected events

Any actual or suspected event that threatens the health or safety of an individual is investigated and reviewed by each provider and waiver agency. Waiver agencies are required to report all such instances to state level quality assurance staff or contractors, who, depending on the nature

and seriousness of the report, may investigate or involve others (such as police or the judicial system).

All deaths in licensed or certified settings are reported to and scrutinized by the state to identify negative trends associated with providers, counties, or the approaches that are used by the service delivery system with the intent of preventing further instances. Concerns are then shared with appropriate entities that are required to make systemic improvements or take corrective actions, to create a constant cycle of improvement. Instances of abuse or neglect are remedied swiftly. Access to necessary medical services is closely monitored.

Involvement of Guardians or Family Members

Counties are required to prepare a plan for home or community-based care for all individuals residing in ICFs-IID and nursing homes who are at a developmental disability level of care. For ICFs-IIDs other than the State Centers, these plans are part of the statutorily required annual court review (know as the Watts review) to determine the most integrated setting appropriate to the person's needs. Counties involve guardians in the preparation of these plans and state law requires that the county provide a copy of the plan to the guardian prior to the Watts review.

When a person is relocated from a State Center or other ICF-IID or nursing home facility, the plan for that individual's care is signed by the guardian indicating his/her acceptance of the plan. Of the 64 persons relocated under the ICF-IID Restructuring Initiative in SFY 2013, guardians all agreed with the plan that was developed.

Most elderly persons and persons with physical disabilities relocated under the Community Relocation Initiative do not have guardians. However, in cases where people do have guardians, the guardians are involved in the efforts to relocate or divert individuals from institutions.

For persons who are competent to make their own decisions, family members are involved to the extent preferred by the individual participant. The Department does not keep a record of family involvement in care planning for individuals who are competent to make their own decisions.

Staff turnover

Appendix C provides Calendar Year 2012 staff turnover rates for ICFs-IID and Nursing Facilities. Data is not yet available for Calendar Year 2013. The attachment lists facilities in order by name and identifies the city or town where the facility is located. Staff turnover rates are provided for both full and part time staff for three professions: Registered Nurses (RNs), Licensed Practical Nurses (LPNs), and Nursing Assistants (NAs).

The staff turnover rate was calculated by the Division of Quality Assurance. Calculations were based upon information submitted in response to the 2012 Annual Staffing Survey (formerly the Annual Survey of Nursing Homes). In this survey each nursing home and ICF-IID provided information about the number of full-time and part-time RNs, LPNs, and nursing assistants hired in 2013. Each nursing home and ICF-IID also provided the total number of full-time and part-time RNs, LPNs, and nursing assistants employed as of December 31, 2012 and their length of

service. The staff turnover rate for each category was calculated by dividing the number of new employees hired in 2012 in that category (e.g., full-time RNs) by the total number of employees in that category on December 31, 2012. The resulting decimal was multiplied by 100 to produce a percentage. For example, if a nursing home hired 2 full-time RNs in 2013 and had 8 full-time RNs as of December 31, 2012, the full-time RN turnover rate was calculated as 25% (2 divided by 8 = .25; $.25 \times 100 = 25\%$).
